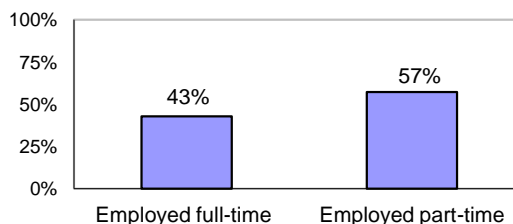

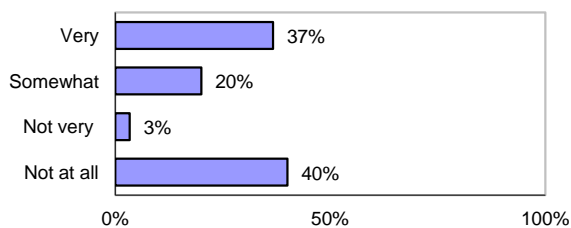


gross median monthly salary of **full-time** main job

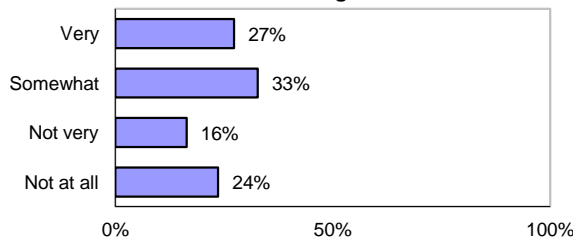
### Usefulness of Studies

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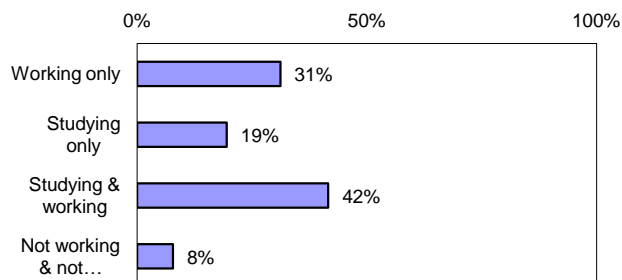

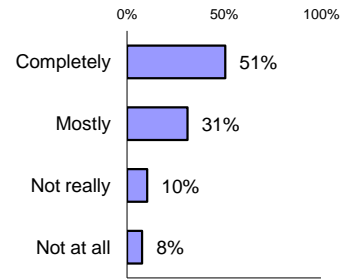

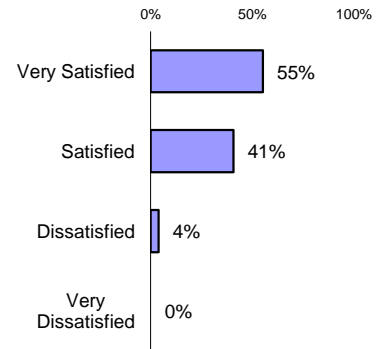
### Overall Satisfaction

#### Was Main Reason for Enrolling Met?



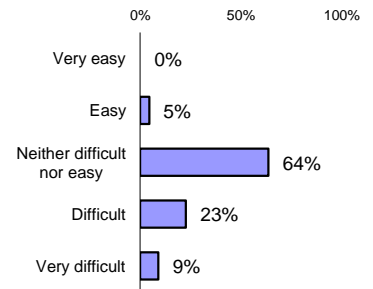

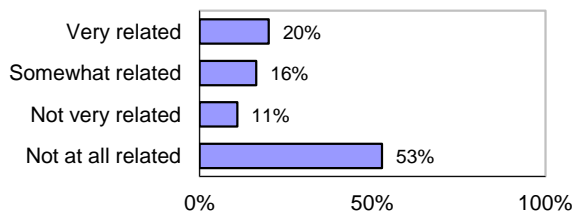

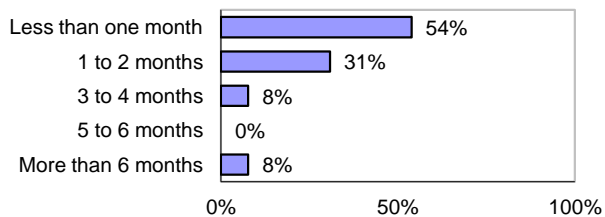
Of Those Currently Employed:
